Founded in the 12th century, and best known for the annual Royal Regatta, Henley attracts some of the world's finest rowers. Just a few strides from the riverbank is the very heart of Henley with its historic church, town hall and market square, the latter bustling with busy stall-holders and shoppers on market days. The town has a plethora of eating places, to suit all tastes and pockets.



Marlow has connections with writers, the Compleat Angler Hotel is named after Izzak Walton's book, and poets, Percy Bysshe Shelley and his wife lived here from March 1817 to February 1818, during which time Shelley wrote Revolt to Islam, while Mary Shelley finished Frankenstein. Marlow is a modern town but still has lots of charm with small streets and old buildings.



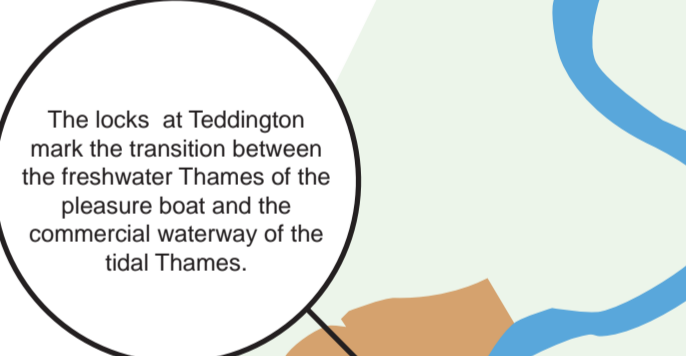

Windsor Marina is within easy reach of the M4 and only 3 miles from Windsor town centre with its shops, restaurants and historic buildings. There are extensive facilities and services on site as well as fuel & electricity.



Egham has a busy town centre with a pedestrianised shopping area. There are two special memorials at Runnymede Meadow: The Magna Carta Memorial, erected to commemorate the sealing of the Magna Carta's 750th Anniversary; and the John F. Kennedy Memorial, an acre of land which was given to the people of America in memory of President John F. Kennedy.



Windsor has many attractions, pubs, restaurants, nightclubs and historic buildings. Home to the Queen of England, Windsor has the largest permanently lived in castle in the world. The town centre has a wide variety of shops and a large indoor shopping area. The Thames runs through the town centre past the castle walls. The ideal place to enjoy dinner next to the river.



The locks at Teddington mark the transition between the pleasure boat and the commercial waterway of the tidal Thames.



Pangbourne is a delightful village, ideal for walkers, photographers and artists alike. The Swan, just upstream from Whitechurch Lock, is one of the few pubs around here with a riverside frontage.



Reading has a bustling town centre, The Oracle and Broad Street Malls lie at either end of Broad Street. Reading also boasts a wide range of restaurants, cafes and bars. The town has a number of arts centres with concert halls, galleries and museums. Much of the surrounding area lies in the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.
